

# Famed Filmmakers, Forgotten Pioneers and Funky Music Form a Full Slate of Chinese and Chinese American Titles at CAAMFest 2014

San Francisco, Feb. 13 — Chinese and Chinese American cinema continues to have a strong presence at CAAMFest 2014 with an impressive array of renowned filmmakers. Director Grace Lee (JEANENE FROM DES MOINES and THE GRACE LEE PROJECT) whose newest feature, and this year's Centerpiece, AMERICAN REVOLUTIONARY: THE EVOLUTION OF GRACE LEE BOGGS, celebrates the extraordinary life of activist, author, philosopher and feminist pioneer Grace Lee Boggs. Legendary filmmaker Ang Lee (CROUCHING TIGER, HIDDEN DRAGON, LIFE OF PI), will be acknowledged with a 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary showcase of his classic culinary drama EAT DRINK MAN WOMAN. BEAUTIFUL 2013 weaves together the visions of several directors, while Louisa Wei's documentary GOLDEN GATE GIRLS uncovers the fascinating story of one of Hollywood's forgotten Chinese American directors, Esther Eng.

#### **FAMED FILMMAKERS**

Spotlight filmmaker Grace Lee returns with her stunning new documentary, AMERICAN REVOLUTIONARY: THE EVOLUTION OF GRACE LEE BOGS, a salute to Grace Lee Boggs. At age 98, Boggs shares her experiences as an outspoken advocate for the rights of African Americans and her dedication for a more just future for all. Lee, who will be in attendance, will also participate in a special conversation about her work, including the 2007 horror-comedy AMERICAN ZOMBIE, also screening at CAAMFest.

The anthology, BEAUTIFUL 2013 features the talents of Wu Nien-jen, Lu Yue, Mabel Cheung and Kurasawa Kiyoshi. The quartet of stories include an oddball boss who falls for a dockworker with a kung fu secret; a beleaguered family man with an existential crisis; a chosen son deciphering good from evil; and a nightclub performer handling a disregarded daughter gone rogue.

In Ang Lee's critically acclaimed EAT DRINK MAN WOMAN, tells the story of master Chinese chef Mr. Chu, his three daughters have and their extravagant Sunday night dinners. Each week, the family meal quickly turns into an "announcement" session, where Confucian traditions meet and clash with modern love and the unpredictability of life.

With a series of critically acclaimed shorts in his repertoire, writer-director J.P. Chan makes his feature film debut with A PICTURE OF YOU, a dramedy that introduces us to two estranged siblings attempt to reconcile their differences over a weekend packing up their late mother's lakehouse.

## **FORGOTTEN PIONEER**

Louisa Wei's GOLDEN GATE GIRLS goes behind the camera to reveal the untold story of Esther Eng, one of the first female Chinese American directors in the United States. Born in San Francisco, the slick-haired Eng drew her inspiration from the traditional Chinese opera, directing and producing her first films by the age of 19. Louisa Wei is expected to be in attendance.

#### A LITTLE SONG AND DANCE

Hao Wu's documentary THE ROAD TO FAME follows a senior class from one of China's most prestigious drama schools. Overseen by an American director, the students compete for roles in a production of the

1980s musical FAME.

Filled with funk, style and fun, Adam Wong's THE WAY WE DANCE dives into the Hong Kong hip-hop dance scene via the charming eyes of its lead protagonist who spends her days working at her family's tofu shop, while daydreaming about her own colorful, pop-and-lockin' dance world.
